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### INTRODUCING GRCC

The Galway Rape Crisis Centre provides a quality professional counselling and support service for survivors of sexual violence and abuse. Through our education workshops we also work towards an end to cultural and societal tolerance of sexual violence and abuse.

The Centre was founded in 1984 by a group of women who were concerned about the lack of services for survivors of sexual abuse. By 2001 GRCC expanded its service to include Male survivors amalgamating the services of MASC (Male Abuse Survivors Centre) which had been formed a few years earlier. Since then it has grown to become the second largest rape crisis centre in Ireland. The Centre currently employs five full-time and 23 part-time staff, 6 Volunteer board members, and has in the region of 4 volunteer counsellors, 21 volunteer Psychological support workers and numerous fundraising and other volunteers.

GRCCs work is overseen by a Board of Directors in order to meet criteria of transparency and accountability set by the Revenue Commissioners and Tusla. We have also signed up to the Governance Code for Community and Voluntary Organisations in Ireland, a clear indication of the pride that the Centre places on best practice in Governance.



## **CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT**

ON BEHALF OF BOARD

2022 saw a lifting of most restrictions despite covid 19 remaining, GRCC are now living with the pandemic, and doing it very well, building on our experiences of 2020/21 where we learned just how resilient our team could be, we were able to continue to conduct our primary function – counselling of individuals who have been subjected to rape or other crimes of sexual abuse.

In that context, I must acknowledge the outstanding efforts of all the staff of GRCC, and of our volunteers, who have spared no efforts in their determination to ensure that we continued to conduct our mission. Once again, on behalf of the Board, I would like to acknowledge and thank our Executive Director Cathy Connolly and everyone else involved in our work for their continuing commitment and dedication. I also freely and sincerely acknowledge the commitment and support of our Board members, whose wisdom and guidance has been extremely helpful to me and to the staff as we continue to develop and support the organisation.

I know that I, and my Board, and the staff and volunteers of the Centre, continue with our determination that everything we do is directed at supporting the vitally important work of the Centre which is client centered.

## **CLINICAL DIRECTORS REPORT**

We saw glimmers of hope in 2022, of heading back to normality after the heaviness of 2 years of Covid. For me, 2022 presented a wonderful opportunity which, luckily, saw me joining GRCC as Clinical Director. I am honoured to be part of such an established and respected organisation and will Endeavor to contribute to GRCC's stellar national reputation.

Yet the aftereffects of the last two years are still being felt. Repeated lockdowns have led to inevitable delays in criminal and legal proceedings, which can have an undeniable negative impact on individuals who have chosen to speak out about their experiences of sexual harm.

We are seeing more and more people presenting having been assaulted by someone who they knew well, who they considered a friend. Sexual assault and violence have permeated our culture and interactions to the point where it can feel like anyone could be a potential victim or perpetrator.

This speaks to our vision in terms of how our services and support are seen by the community. While the clinical and professional services we provide are highly specialised, we are not a specialist organisation, a niche service providing support for an unlucky few. Rather, we are a community organisation, serving and supporting those ever-growing numbers of individuals impacted by sexual violence.

There are many reasons why numbers of incidents of sexual assault are rising. It seems that our culture in terms of responding to victims is indeed changing. Individuals who have been harmed in this way are more willing to report their experience of harm, as we as a society and culture are more willing to listen and respond compassionately. However, it also appears that sexual assault has become almost normalised in certain circles, something which GRCC strives to explore and address through clinical and education and training programmes.

We are also noticing a difference in the kinds of sexual assault people are being subjected to. Individuals report more violence, threats and intimidation used by their perpetrator. Young people in particular often disclose this kind of experience when they come to us, and many struggle with whether to report their experience of sexual violence to the Gardai.

We continue to work closely with the Gardai, particularly the dedicated sexual and domestic violence team at the PSU, Protective services unit, in Renmore to support those clients who wish to explore reporting their experiences of abuse.

With GRCC's 40th birthday next year, we are taking the opportunity to stand back and look at where we've come from and who we are. The social landscape is very different to when GRCC was founded, and we aim over the coming months and years to address any gaps in our service provision.

We are conscious that there are people in our community who are not reaching out to us for support. Men, the LGBTQ+ community, people who are migrant or refugees and the travelling community are all groups who seek support from us in small numbers.

In 2022 we began to meet with individuals and groups from and representing these marginalised communities, and we intend to continue to listen, and to use that knowledge to make our service more accessible to all who need it.

## COMPASSION AND UNDERSTANDING

Creating a culture of compassion & understanding around the survivors of sexual violence & abuse

## **CLINICAL SERVICES**

#### **COUNSELLING SERVICES**

We continue to work together as an organisation and clinical team to provide best practice support options for our clients. This means adopting clinical flexibility in responding to our clients, some of whom may need short-term and some longer-term therapeutic engagements.

Clients are involved in review and discussion with clinical staff in terms of determining what their needs are, and how we might meet those needs. In 2022, there was a 10% increase in appointments offered, which means more and more people are reaching out to us for support.

and training departments continue to work closely locally and nationally with second and third level institutions in preventative and responsive capacities. 18% percent of our clients in 2022 were between 16 and 17 years, with 14.75% being under 16 years.

While our specialized clinical team offer therapeutic support to young people who have been sexually assaulted and raped, our Education and Training Team deliver trainings on Disclosure and Consent to adolescents in schools, parents and teachers in order to fully support young people who may be at risk of victimsation or perpetration of sexual violence.

#### ADOLESCENT PROGRAMME

In 2022, we offered 1,000 counselling appointments to young people who had experienced rape and sexual violence.

We are acutely aware of the particular needs of these individuals, which is why they are referred immediately to our dedicated adolescent programme, wherein highly trained therapists support them.

Parents or carers are also encouraged to attend congruent support sessions as we know that when an individual is harmed in this way, it impacts the entire family. These support sessions allow the family to heal as a unit, together.

45.9% of individuals seeking support in 2022 were aged between 18 to 23 years. This college aged cohort are particularly vulnerable to this kind of crime, and our clinical and education

Our Adolescent Programme has been funded to date by Lifes 2Good, a hugely successful partnership which ended as planned in 2022. We are forever grateful to Lifes2Good for their investment in supporting the young people of the west. We are similarly indebted to the HSE who have agreed to continue to fund the programme, a commitment which speaks to the success of the programme.

#### **GENDER**

GRCC we are acutely aware that significantly larger numbers of women seek support from us, with only under 8% of our clients in 2022 being male. We are aware that, historically, rape crisis centres are seen as support services for women, despite statistics showing that similar numbers of males are victimised in this way.

We have established that generally men are less likely to disclose an experience of sexual violence at all and, if they do, they are much less likely than females to come to us for support. We are committed to addressing this in 2023 and , indeed, began linking with local and national organisations this year in terms of beginning to address this.

It is vital that all community members, regardless of gender identity, sexuality, nationality, religion or ethnicity, know that they are welcome at GRCC for support.

#### NATURE OF ABUSE

By far, the most frequent types of assault we see are rape and child sexual assault, at 32% and 40% respectively. However, we continue to hear from individuals who have experienced marital rape, physical abuse, sexual harassment and aggravated sexual assault. It is so important to us that community members know that we are here to listen regardless of their experience or how long ago it was.

We are hearing more individuals also disclose experiences of violence used against them during sexual assaults. Threats to kill, strangling and other forms of emotional and physical violence are on the increase. There has also been an increase in the number of cases involving internet image-based sexual violence.



Being subject to these experiences can make it even more difficult for an individual to disclose their experience, due to fear. There has also been an increase in the number of people reporting having their drinks spiked with drugs or alcohol.

Being under the influence of alcohol or drugs, whether by choice or not, does not impact your right to not be sexually assaulted morally or legally, and we encourage any person who has had this experience to seek the support they deserve, if they choose.

## **REFERRAL TYPE**

The vast majority of contacts to GRCC are survivors who are seeking support for themselves, at 57%. This type of contact is extremely important, as it is often the first time the survivor has spoken of their experience aloud.

As such, our Front Line staff are absolutely vital as the first point of contact for many survivors engaging with us, and feedback from our clients describes these encounters as supportive, compassionate and encouraging.

## **HELPLINE STATISTICS 2022**

The helpline is available from 10am to 1pm Monday to Friday. There were 8,567 calls. Texts and emails to/from the centre in 2022.

The freephone 1800 355 355 helpline is generally how women and men make their first contact with GRCC. It is the most important, and usually the most common point of contact for our clients when they are seeking the services of GRCC, and this number allows our clients to contact us free of charge and confidentially.

We have seen an increase in contact by people from other professional organisations and services and particularly those who work with young people.

This represents an improved understanding by agencies of the stigma surrounding sexual abuse and sexual violence. Professionals contacting the centre accounted for more than 30 percent of callers.

There is no way to tell before a call is answered who might be on the other side and just how important that first phone call can be to a survivor, to be heard, listenedto, and believed, as they start a challenging path to unburden themselves from the impact sexual violence has on their lives.

## **EDUCATION**

Developing & delivering programmes & services to educate people and help prevent future instances of sexual violence & abuse

#### **EDUCATION AND TRAINING DEPARTMENT**

2022 was another busy year for the GRCC Education and Training department. We facilitated a range of trainings and education initiatives for a variety of schools, colleges, and community organisations throughout the year. The aim of the Education and Training department is to lessen the impact of sexual violence through education.

#### **SCHOOLS**

- We delivered several workshops to students in Gort Community School, Seamount College Kinvara, and Coláiste lognáid throughout the year.
- In partnership with Roscommon CYPSC, we delivered Consent Workshops in three secondary schools in Roscommon and plan to
- facilitate Disclosure Training for school staff in the county.
- In partnership with Aviva our team facilitated a
  Parents Evening in Clifden Community School
  and delivered Consent Workshops to Second
  Year students. We also plan to facilitate a
  Disclosure Training for staff in the school.



## **DISCLOSURE TRAINING**

The training provides participants with the skills and knowledge to respond appropriately with a disclosure of sexual violence, in settings where this is likely to occur.

In 2022 we delivered 117 hours of Disclosure Training to community organisations and college staff and students across Ireland.

## PARTNERSHIP WITHACTIVE\*CONSENT **UNIVERSITY OF GALWAY**

In 2022 our partnership with the Active\*Consent team in University of Galway went from strength to strength. We co-facilitated another iteration of the postgrad module 'Sexual Consent Promotion: Skills and Practice', cofacilitated five roll outs of First Point

of Contact training for staff, as well as co-developing and delivering a version of the First Point of Contact training to Education and Training Boards Ireland staff.

## CONSENT EDUCATION **PROJECT**

The Consent-Ed project finished its delivery and piloting of newly developed materials in December of 2022. The programme saw over 1200 Senior cycle students, 480 Junior Cycle students, and trained 65 teachers in our Consent-Ed Curriculum and project ethos. The programme kick-started our Community of Practice module, offered to new and trained alike. These were well attended and had good engagement. The sessions provided teachers with more information on online sexual harm, healthy/unhealthy relationships, and sexual harassment among adolescents. The project has been extended until finishing off reporting to the EU on the last two years and will start looking towards the next the Consent Ed materials, as well as piloting and evaluation of these materials. #### **PSYCHOLOGICAL SUPPORT TEAM**

The Psychological Support Team (PST) provide 24/7 psychological support and advocacy as part of the team in the Galway Sexual Assault Treatment Unit (SATU).

This support is available to survivors in the aftermath of a sexual assault and rape. This team also provides psychological support to any person who comes to the SATU in support of the survivor.

The PST receives 60-hours of specialist training, which equips them with the core skills required to support and advocate for a survivor in the aftermath of sexual violence.

The training consists of twelve training days.

Our training is evidence based using an approach of mixed learning methods which have been shown to get the best outcomes.

Furthermore, the training is based on a best practice approach in relation to both supporting

survivors and managing the impact of trauma on the Psychological supporter. Following training, the PST joins the roster where they are shadowed for the first three months.

The team is provided with a solid support structure, this includes a debriefer alongside each Psychological Supporter on the roster, along with monthly group supervision and continued support from the Psychological Support Team Manager.

The team is led by our Psychological Support Team Manager Sarahjane Grennan who is a qualified psychotherapist, and over nine years' experience with the Galway Rape Crisis Centre.

2022 saw another successful online training go ahead online and we had nine new members join the Psychological Support Team on completion.

## **SEXUAL ASSAULT TREATMENT UNIT (SATU)**

The Sexual Assault Treatment Unit (SATU) provide specialist care for females and males aged 14 years and over who have been recently sexually assaulted or raped. Our Psychological Support Team (PST) are part of a specialist team of SATU staff who provide easily accessible holistic services, in a supportive and sensitive manner. The service

addresses the medical, psychological, and emotional needs and appropriate follow up care for survivors of sexual violence.

This includes provision of treatment such as emergency contraception and medication to reduce the possibility of developing a sexually transmitted infection. The SATU services respond to requests from the Gardaí for

## PSYCHOLOGICAL SUPPORT TEAM DEBRIEFING

We have a team of 11 debriefers, staff of GRCC. This team are an integral part of the support structure established for the Psychological Support Team it is a means of honoring the organisations duty of care to our valued team of Volunteers.

The debriefers are available while the Psychological Supporter is attending a case in the SATU, a Court case or accompanying to the Garda Meeting. Debriefers offer reassurance to the PST that they have someone to call if support or advice is needed.

the collection of forensic evidence to aid the legal process. If a person wishes to report an incident to An Garda Síochána, this should be done as soon as possible. SATU also provide services for people who do not wish to report the incident to the Gardaí.

There is no charge for any of the SATU services or follow up appointments. In 2022, the psychological support team PST supported 72 survivors and 51 supporters.

## **COURT & GARDA ACCOMPANIMENT**

The centre offers clients accompaniment to services such as the Courts and the Gardai. We also organize reporting to the Gardai in the center's premises if the client would feel more comfortable and help with the writing of Victim Impact Statements post-conviction.

A psychological supporter accompanies the clients to all these services. The impact of COVID-19 was still felt in 2022 with the ever growing back-log of Court cases which led to an increase in the need for additional support as clients dealt with the trauma of postponed hearings.

Thirteen days of trial were accompanied in 2022 involving six clients and nineteen supporters.

However, we know of many client's cases that were postponed to 2023. The impact is enormous, in fact its retraumatizing for the client, and puts an added strain on the demand for our counselling services, without which clients would find it very difficult to navigate our legal process.

This all effected our Waiting lists. Ten clients were provided with Garda accompaniments at our center for either an informal chat or for making an official statement.

The Court accompaniment service is managed by Edna MacNamara who has legal qualifications and twelve years of GRCC work experience in multiple areas.


